BACKGROUND

- Passenger and cargo aviation are projected to grow globally, increasing demand for support facilities
- Minority and low-income populations are disproportionately affected by air pollution produced by airports and cargo facilities
- Research shows trees can help mitigate the negative health effects of these facilities



Figure 1: Proposed development sites around SeaTac Airport, Port of Seattle Real Estate Strategic Plan (2020)

- Published documents indicate over 100 acres of forested land around SeaTac Airport for potential development (Fig 1)
- The objective of this study is to determine how land around SeaTac Airport can be permanently protected from development

INTERNSHIPS & METHODS



Interned with SSCAN through the community advocacy group Defenders of North SeaTac Park (Fig 2 & 3)



Analyzed land use around SeaTac Airport through GIS mapping



Conducted interviews with elected officials and regional planners



Administered a literature review on current airport-community conflicts

RESULTS

4 key planning approaches identified:



Urban Infill

The process of developing vacant or underutilized parcels within existing developed areas



Land Swaps

The exchange of land between two parties, typically between private and public entities

RESULTS CONTINUED



Rezoning

The process of reassigning land to a different category of use and development restrictions



Transportation alternatives

Investments in sustainable transportation alternatives such as high speed rail (HSR)

IMPLICATIONS

- The path forward must involve collaboration between public and private entities to identify successful opportunities for these planning approaches
- Regional planning organizations like the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) can play a more active role in shaping our regional transportation systems through creating policy that supports HSR
- The environmental health impacts of aviation necessitate change within the field of transportation planning — elected officials and planners must advocate for policies that advance the wellbeing of airport communities
